This past year has been one of exciting transformation—hence our tag line 35 YEARS NEW—a nod to our long history in the community and simultaneous recognition of our new status as a general license medical hospice.

As we write this letter, construction on our newly renovated facility is coming to a close. Furniture is due to arrive soon, the walls have been painted, the engraved brick walkway is in place and the courtyards will soon be sodded. With the potential for six additional patient rooms, a new center for our bereavement programs, larger conference space, new offices for clinical staff, and a new family room, we have attained our goal to increase our capacity for services and to be the community resource for end-of-life issues.

On November 17, 2014, Talbot Hospice received the first Certificate of Need granted in the state of Maryland in 15 years. During the process, we were required to be surveyed by several state and national associations in order to ensure that we were capable of providing high quality hospice care. We are pleased to say that we passed all surveys with flying colors.

We have hired an entire clinical team including physicians, nurses, home health aides, and social workers. Now hospice patients can be admitted 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year, and hospice nurses and physicians are available around the clock for a talk or a visit.

Since we received our license we have served 121 patients, most of them in their own homes, but some in our Hospice House and some in facilities. We are especially proud of having created a Pediatric Care Program so that children with a life-limiting illness and their families can be supported while they continue to seek treatment.

Our hearts are full of joy, pride and gratitude for the commitment of our staff, board, volunteers, donors and the community that have partnered with us on the journey of becoming an independent medical hospice while simultaneously doubling the footprint of our facility.

Now it's time now to focus our efforts on celebrating our 35th anniversary year. We look forward to sharing our continued success with you as we approach this milestone in our Talbot Hospice history.

The Essence of Hospice

Dortha "Miss Dot" Fink, age 90, of Royal Oak has had an extraordinary life, but she had never ridden in a convertible until recently during her stay at Talbot Hospice.

Miss Dot served in the military during World War II as a communications officer where she met her husband, George, a radio man. The two eventually settled in Royal Oak where she had a 26-year career with Waverly Press in Easton. A struggle with chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) caused her recent decline and led to her stay at Hospice.

One day while watching TV, Miss Dot saw a couple riding in a convertible and told her Hospice caregiver, Virginia

Whittington, CNA-certified nursing assistant and CHPNA-certified hospice palliative nursing assistant, "That would be fun."

That was all it took to start the ball rolling. Lisa May, MSW, LCSW-C, CT, Director of Family Services, contacted Anne Shannahan, the Hospice Performance Improvement Coordinator and Compliance Officer, to ask how they mightmake Miss Dot's dream possible. According to Anne, "I heard that local residents Doug and Cindy Jurrius had a Cadillac convertible, so I called them up. They said they would love to do it."

When the big day arrived, Miss Dot was anxious and didn't want to be alone on her ride, so Roxie Palmer,

CHPNA, HHA, Hospice Home Health Aide, agreed to come on her day off and ride with her. Ironically, before coming to work at Hospice, Roxie had provided home health care for Miss Dot through Shore Home Care. Roxie comments, "It was my first ride in a convertible too!"

To make her ride complete, Anne created a banner with the words, "Ms. Talbot Hospice," on it. The banner was constructed from air conditioning duct work webbing and bright green Duck Tape®—courtesy of the recent construction at Talbot Hospice. She even stapled a plastic flower to Miss Dot's hat.

With oxygen in tow, Miss Dot boarded her chariot, giving the "royal wave" as she drove off. Cindy and Doug Jurrius took Miss Dot and Roxie for a ride around downtown Easton, including a drive by the old Waverly Press building to see its new transformation. She waved at all who saw her and even asked to go around one more time. Doug Jurrius stopped and bought the group ice cream – Miss Dot's favorite treat.

Roxie recalls, "At one point she asked me to take off her hat so she could feel the air blow through her hair."

In reflecting on her day, Miss Dot exclaimed, "It was wonderful and the ice cream was the topping on the

cake. The caregivers are wonderful here. I love that they are just being themselves."

Miss Dot's daughter, Beth Brown, comments, "She loved her trip in the convertible. She talked about it for days." She adds, "The Hospice staff is like a family. They genuinely care."

Virginia, who has been with Talbot Hospice for 16 years, comments about the staff's role in making patients' wishes happen in their final days, "Everyone has a part when we do something special. We have had holiday meals, birthday parties, anniversary dinners, and even cooked favorite meals for our patients. Personally, I get a thrill and

Miss Dot still relishes the banner and flower that helped dress up her special ride. She comments about the plastic flower still in her room as, "a special flower for a very special day."

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
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

Thursday evenings 5–7 p.m., September 10– October 22 *No class on October 15.*



Gulhrie Award Recipients Recognized

Talbot Hospice employees Donna Allen and Wendy VanNest were recently awarded the Eugene and Elizabeth Guthrie Award for Professional Development, an annual award created to honor and carry forward the commitment and passion of the co-founder of Talbot Hospice, Dr. Eugene "Buck" Guthrie and his wife, Betts. The purpose of the award is to educate

Talbot Hospice staff in a manner that benefits both the individual staff member and the broader community. The award is for training above and beyond the usual requirements.

Wendy VanNest is Director of Pathways for Talbot Hospice, a volunteer program of supportive services for people diagnosed with a life limiting illness who are still seeking curative treatment.

The Guthrie Award will enable

Wendy to continue her ongoing education in thanatology, the study of death and dying, through the Association for Death Education and Counseling. Wendy is undertaking a year-long project of intensive immersion in the study of death and dying, loss and grief, spirituality

and religion, advance care planning, care for the caregiver, integrative medicine and holistic therapies, family dynamics and cultural diversity. Wendy will share her knowledge through volunteer in-services and plans to create a new program to increase outreach to caregivers.

Donna Allen is the Clinical Records and Billing Manager for Talbot Hospice and is responsible for ensuring

accurate diagnosis and procedure codes in billing. The Guthrie Award will allow Donna to take a Medical Coding Professional course which offers extensive training in the new International Classification of Diseases requirements (ICD 10) which become mandatory on October 1, 2015. The course also offers indepth training in Current Procedural Terminology (CPT) and Healthcare Common Procedure Coding

System (HCPCS). These standardized coding systems assign numbers to every item and service provided in the delivery of health care and ensure that insurance claims are processed in an orderly and consistent manner.
